**ARPAST PRESIDENT LARRY FLAXMAN DISCUSSES UNIQUE EVP THEORY
ON DISCOVERY CHANNEL'S "GHOST LAB"**

Larry Flaxman, Founder and President of ARPAST, the Arkansas Paranormal and Anomalous Studies Team, one of the nation's largest paranormal research organizations, appeared in a SKYPE interview on the December 8th, 2009 episode of the Discovery Channel's new paranormal TV series, "Ghost Lab." The Ghost Lab investigation took place at the notorious Alcatraz Island prison off the coast of San Francisco, California and involved the collection of several high quality EVP, or Electronic Voice Phenomena, alleged to be the voices of deceased inmates and guards.

Larry discussed with the Klinge Brothers, stars of "Ghost Lab," a unique theory that his organization, ARPAST, has been researching over the last several years. This theory involves the presence of two unusual components that ARPAST has discovered occur immediately preceding an EVP:

- 1) A spike in EMF, or Electromagnetic Field activity, which in some cases has been significant.
- 2) An "impulse pop" immediately preceding the EVP, found in approximately 90% of EVP collected.

Flaxman states, "Perhaps the EMF spike and the impulse pop serve as a form of modulated carrier waves which is used to transmit the audio signal (EVP)... or even a type of 'threshold modulation' or 'gating energy' which is released."

ARPAST is devoting further study to the "ARPAST EVP Theory," which was corroborated by the "Ghost Lab" team towards the end of the episode when two significant EMF spikes were recorded just before two Class A EVP.
